Birding Canyon Country Species List | May 18 – 26, 2024 with Naturalist Journeys



Compiled by guide Dave Mehlman with guide Steve Grace. Our clients included Carol, Charlotte, Gary, Howard, Lynne, and Rachel.

Tour Summary: This 10-day/9-night tour (everyone came in a day early allowing for an extra day to the tour!) of southwest Utah and northern Arizona explored some of the best known and most scenic landscapes of the American Southwest, focusing on the Grand Staircase of the Colorado Plateau. Our primary area of focus were 4 national parks: Zion, Grand Canyon (North Rim), Bryce Canyon, and Capitol Reef. We spent a full day in each park, immersing ourselves in the incredible geology and diverse wildlife that occur in each one. Our extra day allowed us to work in some additional birds and diversity from the lowlands of the Mojave Desert, which reach their northern extent near St. George, Utah, the start and end of our tour. In addition to fabulous landscapes and wonderful birds, we enjoyed comfortable lodging and great meals, many of which were outdoors in the middle of these wonderful places.

BIRDS (116 species recorded, of which 3 were heard only and 1 were seen by the guides only):

DUCKS, GEESE AND SWANS: Anatidae (8)

Canada Goose *Branta canadensis*—Found on 4 days of the tour at places with suitable, larger water bodies: the golf course by Tonaquint, Jackson Flat Reservoir, and the pond at Ruby's Inn

Cinnamon Teal *Spatula cyanoptera*—Several of this lovely duck species were found on the same day at the pond at Ruby's Inn and at the Boulder Inn pond

Gadwall Mareca strepera—Only seen at Jackson Flat Reservoir

Mallard Anas platyrhynchos—Commonly encountered at sites with appropriate habitat: bodies of water

Redhead Aythya americana—Found at Jackson Flat Reservoir

Ring-necked Duck Aythya collaris—Found at Jackson Flat Reservoir

Common Merganser *Mergus merganser*—One fly-by female type over the Virgin River at Zion was the only sighting **Ruddy Duck** *Oxyura jamaicensis*—Seen at Jackson Flat Reservoir and on both visits to the pond at Ruby's Inn

NEW WORLD QUAIL: Odontophoridae (1)

Gambel's Quail Callipepla gambelii—Found at Grafton and behind the Capitol Reef Resort

PARTRIDGES, PHEASANTS AND ALLIES: Phasianidae (1)

Wild Turkey *Meleagris gallopavo*—Seen on 2 days in Zion, most notably when a male "strutted his stuff" on the lawn in front of the Zion Lodge dining area for two females (both of which appeared to be ignoring him!)

GREBES: Podicipedidae (3)

Pied-billed Grebe Podilymbus podiceps—Quite a few in Jackson Flat Reservoir

Eared Grebe Podiceps nigricollis—One seen with the scope at Jackson Flat Reservoir

Western Grebe Aechmophorus occidentalis—One seen with the scope at Jackson Flat Reservoir

PIGEONS AND DOVES: Columbidae (2)

Eurasian Collared-Dove Streptopelia decaocto—(I) Seen on four days in various towns visited

Mourning Dove Zenaida macroura—Recorded on 4 days, either flying or heard

CUCKOOS AND ALLIES: Cuculidae (1)

Greater Roadrunner *Geococcyx californianus*—A nicely seen bird at Grafton was the only one of this classic southwestern species that we observed

SWIFTS: Apodidae (1)

White-throated Swift Aeronautes saxatalis—Found on 7 days of the tour at all of the parks, which provide great habitat for this species; most notable was an apparent nesting colony of many swifts in a crack in the wall high above the Petroglyphs pull-out at Capitol Reef

HUMMINGBIRDS: Trochilidae (3)

Black-chinned Hummingbird Archilochus alexandri—The most numerous and frequently encountered hummingbird of the tour, though almost always at lower elevations, we found these at Tonaquint, Calf Creek Campground, and Capitol Reef, though an out-of-elevation individual was at Cape Royal in the Grand Canyon

Anna's Hummingbird *Calypte anna*—A male was found very nicely perched in the top of a tree at Tonaquint, albeit very backlit

Broad-tailed Hummingbird *Selasphorus platycercus*—Found on 3 days at Zion East Entrance road, the Jacob Lake Inn fountain, and on the Bristlecone Trail at Bryce

RAILS, COOTS AND ALLIES: Rallidae (1)

American Coot Fulica americana—By far the most abundant waterbird of the tour, these "duck-like" birds were quite common on the larger water bodies visited; seen at Jackson Flat Reservoir, the pond behind Ruby's Inn, and Boulder pond

SANDPIPERS AND ALLIES: Scolopacidae (2)

Red-necked Phalarope *Phalaropus lobatus*—Good, but distant, views of one in breeding plumage in the pond behind Ruby's Inn on the first visit

Spotted Sandpiper *Actitis macularius*—Several seen by the group at Jackson Flat Reservoir and by Dave at the pond behind Ruby's Inn

GULLS AND TERNS: Laridae (2)

Bonaparte's Gull *Chroicocephalus philadelphia*—One, unexpectedly, flew into the pond behind Ruby's Inn and bathed on the first visit to the pond behind Ruby's Inn

Ring-billed Gull Larus delawarensis—Several out floating in Jackson Flat Reservoir

CORMORANTS: Phalacrocoracidae (1)

Neotropic Cormorant *Nannopterum brasilianum*—Three, at least one in breeding plumage, in a tree at Jackson Flat Reservoir

HERONS AND EGRETS: Ardeidae (1)

Great Blue Heron Ardea herodias—One flew by as we were birding at Tonaquint Park

NEW WORLD VULTURES: Cathartidae (2)

California Condor *Gymnogyps californianus*—Easily one of the best sightings of the tour, the group found six of these incredible birds soaring over Navajo Bridge and sitting on the bridges. Through diligent work by Dave (with bins) and Charlotte (with camera), we were able to read the following wing tags (info from www.condorspotter.com):

- V3: male; age 7 years, 0 months; hatched May 10, 2017 at Oregon Zoo
- 33: male, age 2 years, 1 month; hatched April 11, 2022 at World Center for Birds of Prey
- X2: female, age 8 years, 0 months; hatched May 7, 2018 in the wild
- P8: female, age 10 years, 1 month; hatched April 2, 2014 at Oregon Zoo
- L4: female, age 13 years, 0 months; hatched May 27, 2011 in the wild; this bird was also seen on the September 2023 tour
- K6: male, age 14 years, 0 months; hatched May 24, 2010 at World Center for Birds of Prey

Turkey Vulture Cathartes aura—About as close to a guaranteed species you can get on this tour, we saw these on 7 days pretty much at all sites visited and while driving

OSPREY: Pandionidae (1)

Osprey Pandion haliaetus—Found at Grafton and Jackson Flat Reservoir

HAWKS, KITES, AND EAGLES: Accipitridae (3)

Cooper's Hawk Accipiter cooperii—One soared over while at Tonaguint Park

Swainson's Hawk Buteo swainsoni—One seen by Dave's car near Richfield on the way back to St. George from Torrey Red-tailed Hawk Buteo jamaicensis—As expected, the most commonly encountered raptor of the tour; found on 5 days at several sites

WOODPECKERS: Picidae (6)

Lewis's Woodpecker *Melanerpes lewis*—A fun highlight of this tour, one individual was observed well in the dead Ponderosa on Boulder Mountain and in an adjacent Gambel's Oak

Acorn Woodpecker *Melanerpes formicivorus*—(G) A brief glimpse of one by Dave that flew into the dead Ponderosa on Boulder Mountain as we arrived at the site

Downy Woodpecker *Dryobates pubescens*—Only found at Grafton

Ladder-backed Woodpecker *Dryobates scalaris*—Nice views of a male in the mulberry tree at Tonaquint **Hairy Woodpecker** *Dryobates villosus*—Only seen once at one of the stops on the Zion East Entrance Road **Northern Flicker** *Colaptes auratus*—(H) Heard calling at North Rim

FALCONS AND CARACARAS: Falconidae (2)

American Kestrel Falco sparverius—Seen on 2 days while driving

Peregrine Falcon Falco peregrinus—A fly-by of one during our morning birding at Capitol Reef Resort was the only one of the tour

TYRANT FLYCATCHERS: Tyrannidae (8)

Western Wood Pewee *Contopus sordidulus*—Surprisingly hard to find on the tour this year, we only found these on our day at Capitol Reef, where quite a few were seen on the various walks along the Fremont River near the campground

Olive-sided Flycatcher *Contopus cooperi*—Wonderful views of this large pewee (sorry about the oxymoron, but I have nothing to do with the names!) were had along the Fremont River at Capitol Reef, including when it caught and ate a huge dragonfly

Black Phoebe Sayornis nigricans—Only found by the small pond at Tonaquint, where they were nesting under the platform

Say's Phoebe Sayornis saya—This elegant, western phoebe was found at Tonaquint and Grafton on the first day and again on both visits to the pond behind Ruby's Inn and at the Boulder pond

Vermilion Flycatcher Pyrocephalus rubinus—Found at Grafton on the first day

Ash-throated Flycatcher Myiarchus cinerascens—Only encountered at Capitol Reef on the Fremont River trail

Western Kingbird *Tyrannus verticalis*—Found at the start of the tour at Tonaquint and Grafton and again at the end of the tour at Capitol Reef Resort

Cassin's Kingbird Tyrannus vociferans—One seen at a distance on the first visit to the pond behind Ruby's Inn

VIREOS: Vireonidae (3)

Cassin's Vireo Vireo cassinii—Only seen on the Grotto Trail hike at Zion

Plumbeous Vireo Vireo plumbeus—Recorded on 4 days at Zion, Calf Creek Campground, and Capitol Reef

Warbling Vireo Vireo gilvus—Only encountered 3 times in Zion, Calf Creek Campground, and Capitol Reef

CROWS AND JAYS: Corvidae (6)

Pinyon Jay *Gymnorhinus cyanocephalus*—The lone sighting (in fact, lone bird!) of the tour was one very well seen at La Fevre Overlook on highway 89A

Steller's Jay *Cyanocitta stelleri*—Generally the common jay of mountain forests in the west, we found these on all days at Grand Canyon, North Rim, and Bryce Canyon

Woodhouse's Scrub-Jay *Aphelocoma woodhouseii*—Recorded on 4 days in Zion, North Rim, Calf Creek Campground, and at the woodpecker tree

Black-billed Magpie *Pica hudsonia*—Generally seen a few times while driving during the latter part of the tour; ironically, most were seen on the drive back to St. George from Torrey!

Clark's Nutcracker *Nucifraga columbiana*—A classic mountain bird of the western high forests, we found this species at Point Imperial, North Rim; Fairyland Point, Bryce Canyon; and a the woodpecker tree outside Boulder

Common Raven Corvus corax—One of the most regularly encountered species; seen on 8 days throughout the tour

TITS AND CHICKADEES: Paridae (2)

Mountain Chickadee *Poecile gambeli*—Seen at North Rim Grand Canyon, La Fevre Overlook, and on the Bristlecone Trail at Bryce

Juniper Titmouse Baeolophus ridgwayi—Found on the Grotto Trail hike, Zion, and at La Fevre Overlook

PENDULINE TITS: Remizidae (1)

Verdin Auriparus flaviceps—A classic low desert species, we found these at Tonaquint

SWALLOWS AND MARTINS: Hirundinidae (4)

Northern Rough-winged Swallow *Stelgidopteryx serripennis*—Recorded in Zion, at Jackson Flat Reservoir, and at the Boulder pond

Violet-green Swallow *Tachycineta thalassina*—A very widespread and frequently encountered species, we found these at every site in the mountains; recordedon 6 days of the tour

Barn Swallow Hirundo rustica—Oddly, only found on the 2 visits to the pond behind Ruby's Inn

Cliff Swallow *Petrochelidon pyrrhonota*—A large colony on the road bridge by Tonaquint that was sending out numerous foraging birds represented the only sighting of the tour

LONG-TAILED TITS: Aegithalidae (1)

Bushtit Psaltriparus minimus—A pair seen at Cape Royal, North Rim

SILKY-FLYCATCHERS: Ptiliogonatidae (1)

Phainopepla Phainopepla nitens—At least 3 of these remarkable, frugivorous birds seen at Grafton

NUTHATCHES: Sittidae (3)

White-breasted Nuthatch Sitta carolinensis—Found near the fountain at Jacob Lake Inn

Pygmy Nuthatch Sitta pygmaea — Seen at North Rim (where we found a nest in an oak tree) and Bryce Canyon

Red-breasted Nuthatch Sitta canadensis—Seen at North Rim and Bryce Canyon

GNATCATCHERS: Polioptilidae (1)

Blue-gray Gnatcatcher *Polioptila caerulea*—Seen on two days, first along the east entrance road to Zion after exiting the tunnel and again at Capitol Reef along the Fremont River

WRENS: Troglodytidae (4)

Rock Wren Salpinctes obsoletus—Seen by a few at Navajo Bridge and by Rachel and Steve on the Fremont Overlook Trail in Capitol Reef

Canyon Wren *Catherpes mexicanus*—(H) One was heard singing during our walk on the Riverside Trail in Zion; an appropriate place if there ever was one!

House Wren *Troglodytes aedon*—Seen or heard on 2 days at Zion and again on the Bristlecone Trail at Bryce **Bewick's Wren** *Thryomanes bewickii*—(H) Heard at Grafton

DIPPERS: Cinclidae (1)

American Dipper Cinclus mexicanus—An avian highlight of the tour, we found 3 of these aquatic denizens along the Virgin River in Zion

STARLINGS: Sturnidae (1)

European Starling Sturnus vulgaris—(I) Recorded on 8 days of the tour, mostly at low elevation sites at the beginning and end

MOCKINGBIRDS AND THRASHERS: Mimidae (2)

Northern Mockingbird *Mimus polyglottos*—One was singing from a telephone pole at the Cliffside Restaurant on the first day of the tour

Gray Catbird *Dumetella carolinensis*—A first for Dave on this tour, we found a pair at Calf Creek Campground and had incredible views of a singing bird along the Fremont River in Capitol Reef

THRUSHES: Turdidae (4)

Western Bluebird Sialia mexicana—Seen at Grafton and Jacob Lake

Mountain Bluebird *Sialia currucoides*—Several of these, including a beautiful male, were seen on the Bristlecone Pine Trail at Bryce Canyon

Townsend's Solitaire *Myadestes townsendi*—Finally found on the day we left Bryce Canyon; there were at least two hanging out on the Tropic Ditch on the Mossy Cave trail

American Robin Turdus migratorius—Found on every day of the tour at almost all sites visited

OLD WORLD SPARROWS: Passeridae (1)

House Sparrow Passer domesticus—(I) Recorded on 7 days of the tour, generally in inhabitated areas

FINCHES: Fringillidae (6)

Evening Grosbeak *Coccothraustes vespertinus*—A female eating seeds put on a great show for us at the Boulder Mountain Lodge

House Finch Haemorhous mexicanus—Despite its general commonness, only found on 3 days of the tour

Cassin's Finch *Haemorhous cassinii*—Found on 3 days in Zion on the east entrance road, Jacob Lake Inn, and in or near Bryce Canyon

Red Crossbill Loxia curvirostra—We had great luck with this species on the tour, finding them in great numbers at close range at Jacob Lake Inn and the Ruby's Inn pond

Pine Siskin *Spinus pinus*—Very numerous and frequently encountered during the tour at many sites visited with the odd exception of Zion

Lesser Goldfinch Spinus psaltria — Seen on 3 days of the tour at Tonaquint, Calf Creek, Boulder pond, and Capitol Reef

NEW WORLD SPARROWS: Passerellidae (8)

Chipping Sparrow Spizella passerina—Seen on 4 days at Grafton, North Rim, Jacob Lake Inn, and Bryce Canyon Lark Sparrow Chondestes grammacus—One of the more elegant species of sparrow, we saw these at Grafton and along the east entrance road to Zion

Dark-eyed Junco *Junco hyemalis*—Seen on almost all days at North Rim and Bryce Canyon; all were of the breeding Gray-headed form

White-crowned Sparrow Zonotrichia leucophrys—Nearing the tail end of their migration, we found these at Grafton and at Calf Creek Campground

Song Sparrow *Melospiza melodia*—Infrequently encountered on the tour, these were seen or heard at Tonaquint, Zion, Boulder pond, and Capitol Reef

Abert's Towhee Melozone aberti—Found at Tonaquint, the only site with Mojave Desert habitat on the tour Green-tailed Towhee Pipilo chlorurus—Seen at 2 different viewpoint stops at Bryce and again at Calf Creek Campground Spotted Towhee Pipilo maculatus—Encountered throughout the tour, but most often in Zion and at Calf Creek Campground

YELLOW-BREASTED CHAT: Icteriidae (1)

Yellow-breasted Chat *Icteria virens*—We first mostly heard (with brief glimpses) this fascinating bird at Calf Creek Campground, but they really put on a show for us with great views along the Fremont River Trail in Capitol Reef

NEW WORLD BLACKBIRDS: Icteridae (6)

Yellow-headed Blackbird *Xanthocephalus xanthocephalus*—Great views of males and females at the pond behind Ruby's Inn on both visits; we saw them again at the Boulder pond

Bullock's Oriole Icterus bullockii—Found at the start and end of the tour at Tonaquint and Capitol Reef

Red-winged Blackbird Agelaius phoeniceus—Seen on 3 days at Tonaquint, Jackson Flat Reservoir, and Boulder pond

Brown-headed Cowbird Molothrus ater—Found at Tonaquint, Coral Pink Sand Dunes, and Capitol Reef

Brewer's Blackbird *Euphagus cyanocephalus*—Although very common around Bryce Canyon City (at Ruby's pond), the only other place we saw this blackbird was at the woodpecker tree

Great-tailed Grackle Quiscalus mexicanus—Found at Tonaquint and Jackson Flat Reservoir

NEW WORLD WARBLERS: Parulidae (7)

Virginia's Warbler *Leiothlypis virginiae*—One of the "ladies' warblers", we found these on the east entrance road to Zion and at Grand Canyon, North Rim

MacGillivray's Warbler Geothlypis tolmiei—One was seen by Charlotte and Dave while eating lunch at Calf Creek Campground

Yellow Warbler *Setophaga petechia*—Commonly encountered in areas with riparian habitats, particularly cottonwoods, visited at Tonaquint, Grafton, Zion, Calf Creek, and Capitol Reef

Yellow-rumped Warbler *Setophaga coronata*—The most commonly encountered warbler of the tour, these were recorded on 4 days at many sites; all were of the western, Audubon's, form, with a yellow throat

Grace's Warbler *Setophaga graciae*—A ponderosa pine specialist, we found these on 3 days along the east entrance road to Zion, at North Rim (where seen or heard at many stops), and at the Jacob Lake Inn fountain

Black-throated Gray Warbler Setophaga nigrescens—

Wilson's Warbler *Cardellina pusilla*—Unexpectedly scarce on this tour, we only found one in the willow thickets along the Fremont River at Capitol Reef

CARDINAL, GROSBEAKS, AND ALLIES: Cardinalidae (4)

Summer Tanager Piranga rubra—Only found in Zion on 2 of the days there

Western Tanager *Piranga ludoviciana*—Quite frequently seen throughout the tour at most sites visited; evidently some still on their northward spring migration

Black-headed Grosbeak Pheucticus melanocephalus—Found at most sites visited throughout the tour

Lazuli Bunting *Passerina amoena*—Oddly, only found at Capitol Reef during our day there, where they were easily seen; Carol and Dave had the remarkable experience of seeing 7 on the ground at the same time eating dandelion seeds!

MAMMALS (11 species recorded):

Mule Deer *Odocoileus hemionus*—Seen on almost all days of the tour, sometimes very close by as on the front lawn at Zion and in the Capitol Reef orchards

Pronghorn Antilocapra americana—Recorded on 2 days, generally while driving

Black-tailed Jackrabbit, Lepus californicus—One reported in Zion

Desert Cottontail Sylvilagus audubonii—Seen on both days near Capitol Reef

Utah Prairie Dog Cynomys parvidens—Present in the known colonies inside Bryce Canyon

Yellow-bellied Marmot Marmota flaviventris—Found at Capitol Reef

Golden-mantled Ground Squirrel Callospermophilus lateralis—Several of these seen while at Bryce Canyon

Rock Squirrel Otospermophilus variegatus—A common and, in many places such as Zion, ubiquitous mammal; recorded on 6 days of the tour

Cliff Chipmunk Neotamias dorsalis—Grand Canyon, North Rim

Hopi Chipmunk Neotamias rufus—Calf Creek Campground

Muskrat Ondatra zibethicus—Seen swimming in the pond behind Ruby's Inn on both visits

REPTILES AND AMPHIBIANS (3 species recorded):

Western Whiptail Aspidocelis tigris—This very large and handsome whiptail as recorded on 4 days at Zion and Capitol Reef

Plateau Striped Whiptail Aspidocelis velox—Photographed by Charlotte at Zion

Canyon Tree Frog Dryophytes arenicolor—At least 18 seen sunning on a large boulder in Middle Emerald Pool in Zion

INSECTS (4 species recorded):

Cabbage White Pieris rapae—Seen on many days of the tour

Field Crescent Phyciodes pulchella—

Coral Pink Sand Dunes Tiger Beetle Cicindela albissima—Several seen by Steve at its namesake park

Flame Skimmer Libellua saturata—
