Bird List

Anatidae: Ducks, Geese and Swans

Coscoroba Swan (*Coscoroba coscoroba*) A pair observed at the nature reserve across the street from the hotel.

Upland Goose (*Chloephaga picta*) Seen at many locations throughout the extension.

Kelp Goose (Chloephaga hybrida) A few along the rocky shores in Ushuaia near the dump.

Ashy-headed Goose (Chloephaga poliocephalia) Seen mixed in with flocks of Upland Geese.

Flying Steamer-Duck (Tachyeres patachonicus) Observed on a couple of inland lakes.

Crested Duck (*Lophonetta specularioides*) Often mixed in with other waterfowl on inland lakes and ponds and along the coast.

Red Shoveler (Spatula plataiea) Common on inland ponds in and around Rio Grande.

Chiloe Wigeon (Mareca sibilatrix) Observed at the nature reserve across the street from the hotel.

Yellow-billed Pintail (Anas georgica) Relatively common at inland ponds.

Yellow-billed Teal (Anas flavirostris) Occasional observations at inland ponds in and around Rio Grande.

Phoenicopteridea: Flamingos

Chilean Flamingo (Phoenicopterus chilensis) A small group were observed at the nature reserve near the hotel.

Podicipedidae: Grebes

Great Grebe (Podiceops major) Observed on a lake on our drive back to Ushuaia from Rio Grande.

Rallidea: Rails and Coots

White-winged Coot (*Fulica leucopterea*) Observed on the lake at the nature reserve near the hotel in Rio Grande.

Pluvianellidae: Magellanic Plover

Magellanic Plover (*Pluvianellus socialis*) Good looks at a few birds on a saline wetland just outsied Rio Grande on a rather windy day.

Haematopodidae: Oystercatchers

Magellanic Oystercatcher (Haematopus leucopodus) Several were observed in and around Rio Grande.

Charadriidae: Plovers and Lapwings

Tawny-throated Dotterel (*Oreopholus ruficollis*). A few were observed in the uplands by the small lake near the hotel.

Southern Lapwing (Vanellus chilensis) Seen every day during the extension.

Two-banded Plover (*Charadrius falklandicus*) Rather common in uplands and along small wetlands each day of the extension.

Rufous-chested Dotterel (Charadrius modestus) Seen well in grasslands on the sheep estancia near Rio Grande.

Thinocoridae: Seedsnipe

White-bellied Seedsnipe (Attagis malouinus). Great, but relatively brief, views after our expedition through the beech forest to alpine habitats at Giribaldi Pass.

Least Seedsnipe (*Thinocorus rumicivorus*) Relatively common in grassland habitats around Rio Grande including one observeation of an adult with chicks.

Scolopacidae: Sandpipers and Allies

Hudsonian Godwit (*Limosa haemastca*) A small flock circled the van at the nature reserve near the hotel.

Whimbrel (Numenisu phaeopus) A few in the coastal grasslands in Rio Grande.

Red Knot (Calidris canufus) A number of birds were mixed in with Hudsonian Godwits that flew past.

White-rumped Sandpiper (Calidris fuscicollis) Common sandpiper in coastal areas.

Baird's Sandpiper (*Calidris bairdii*) Most common sandpiper, observed along shores, but also quite common in upland grassland habitats.

Magellanic Snipe (Gallinago paraguaiae) One observed in Ushuaia in the urban nature reserve along the coast.

Greater Yellowlegs (Tringa melanoleuca) A few found in a freshwater lake near the hotel.

Lesser Yellowlegs (*Tringa flavipes*) Seen at the nature reserve near the hotel.

Stercorariidae: Skuas and Jaegers

Chilean Skua (Stercorarius chilensis) Many were seen at the dump in Ushuaia and along the coast.

<u>Laridae: Gulls</u>

Dolphin Gull (*Leucophaeus scoresbii*) Many foraging with mixed groups of birds at the dump and along the coast in Ushiaia.

Kelp Gull (*Larus dominicanus*) Common in a variety of habitats.

Brown-hooded Gull (Chroicocephalus maculipennis) Observed along the coast.

Sternidae: Terns

South American Tern (Sterna hirundinacea) Observed along the coast in Ushuaia.

Procellariidae: Petrels and Shearwaters

Southern Giant-Petrel (*Macronectes giganteus*) Observed along the coast in a few different locations during the extension.

Phalacrocoracidae: Cormorants

Imperial Cormorant (*Phalacrocorax atriceps*) Observed along the coast.

Threskiornithidae: Ibis

Black-faced Ibis (*Theristicus melanopis*) Seen in a variety of habitats each day of the extension.

Ardeidae: Herons and Egrets

Black-crowned Night-Heron (*Nycticorax nycticorax*) A few were observed fishing along the banks of the river near the dump in Ushuaia.

Cathartidae: New World Vultures

Turkey Vulture (Cathartes aura) One found on the way to the dump.

Andean Condor (*Vultur gryphus*) One soared over the group as we descended from the alpine area at Giribaldi Pass.

Accipitridae: Hawks, Kites and Eagles

Black-chested Buzzard-Eagle (*Geranoaetus melanoleucus*) Quite a few were seen foraging at the dump in Ushuaia.

Falconidae: Falcons and Caracaras

White-throated Caracara (*Phalcoboenus albogularis*) One was observed at Giribaldi Pass, and many more were found at the Ushuaia dump.

Southern (Crested) Caracara (*Caracara plancus*) Seen fairly often along the roads in and around Rio Grande and along the highway from Ushuaia to Rio Grande.

Chimango Caracara (Milvago chimango) Relatively common in Rio Grande and Ushuaia.

Peregrine Falcon (*Falco peregrinus*) We observed at least one near a known nesting location north of Rio Grande.

Columbidae: Pigeons and Doves

Rock Pigeon (Columba livia) Relatively common in Rio Grande.

Furnariidae: Ovenbirds

Common Miner (*Geositta cunicularia*) A fairly common bird in upland habitats in and around Rio Grande. **Bar-winged Cincloides** (*Cinclodes fuscus*) Seen a number of times while traversing the alpine habitat at Giribaldi

Pass.

Thorn-tailed Rayodito (*Aphrasura spinicauda*) A few were found in the forest during our lunch stop on our way back to Ushuaia.

Tyrannidae: Tyrant Flycatchers

Dark-faced Ground-Tyrant (*Muscisaxicola maclovianus*) We observed a few in the alpine zone at Giribaldi Pass.

Ochre-naped Ground-Tyrant (Muscisaxicola flavinucha) Observed at Giribaldi Pass in the alpine zone.

Austral Negrito (Lessonia fufa) Fairly common in open habitats around Rio Grande.

Tufted Tit-Tyrant (*Anairetes parulus*) Good looks during our lunch stop on our way back to Ushuaia.

Hirundinidae: Swallows and Martins

Chilean Swallow (*Golondrina chilea*) Common swallow in forested habitats.

Troglodytidae: Wrens

(Southern) House Wren (*Troglodytes aedon*) A few were found in shrubby, forested habitats between Ushuaia and Rio Grande.

Turdidae: Thrushes

Austral Thrush (Turdus falcklandii) Fairly common in forested areas between Ushuaia and Rio Grande.

Motacillidae: Pipits and Wagtails

Correndera Pipit (*Anthus correndera*) Hard to get good looks at, but we did see a few in the grasslands around Rio Grande.

Passerellidae: New World Sparrows

Rufous-collared Sparrow (Zonotrichia capensis) Common sparrow wherever there were shrubs.

Thraupidae: Tanagers and allies

Patagonian Sierra Finch (*Phrygilus patagonicus*) A few were seen in the forests between Rio Grande and Ushuaia.

Yellow-bridled Finch (*Melanodera xanthogramma*) A pair was foraging in the alpine habitat at Giribaldi Pass. **Patagonia Yellow-Finch** (*Sicalis lebruni*). A few pairs were found in the grassland habitats around Rio Grande.

Fringillidae: Finches and Euphonias

Black-chinned Siskin (Spinus barbatus) A few small groups were seen, including one group at Giribaldi Pass.

Icteridae: New World Blackbirds

Long-tailed Meadowlark (*Leistes loyca*) Somewhat common where there were shrubs and grasslands including coastal grasslands in Rio Grande.

Passeridae: Old World Sparrows

House Sparrow (Passer domesticus) Hanging around the urban areas of Rio Grande.

MAMMALS

Guanaco (*Lama guanicoe*) We observed many during the trip in grasslands around Rio Grande as well as lower elevation grasslands mixed with forested areas between Ushuaia and Rio Grande.

Patagonia Fox (Lycalopex griseus) One small group was observed along a rural road outside of Rio Grande.
