Trinidad & Tobago: Incredible Birds & Wildlife Species List | April 4 – 13, 2024 with Naturalist Journeys

Trinidad

Our 2024 Naturalist Journeys Trinidad and Tobago trip included several days based at the newly renovated Asa Wright Nature Centre, where we spent time getting ourselves in shape for the rest of the trip by birding the hills behind the center. Asa Wright Nature Centre is a sanctuary located in an ancient rainforest of the Northern Range of the island of Trinidad. Our Naturalist Journeys team spent one full day birding and breathing in the sweet air of the mountains of the Northern Range. Asa Wright Nature Centre was established in 1967 with a mission to protect part of the Arima and Aripo valleys for wildlife conservation, education, and scientific research. One of the iconic birds to see and hear are the easily accessible breeding colony of nocturnal Oilbirds in Dunstan Cave, found on the Centers 1,500 acres of protected rainforest, which houses a rich biota with an outstanding species list that includes native mammals, birds, reptiles, amphibians, and butterflies, and a variety of flowering plant species. While in Trinidad we visited the Northern Range along the Blanchisseuse Road into Brasso Seco village and drove to the village of Morne la Croix for the amazing Rufous-tailed Jacamar. Lodging at Hacienda Jacana for the next two nights allowed visits to Trinidad's Atlantic coast and Nariva Swamp followed by dinner and night birds at Eteck park Wallerfield, which was a particularly unique experience. A morning of cultural visits to Temple by the Sea and the towering 85-foot statue of Lord Hanuman in the village of Carapichaima, gave us all a deeper understanding of the Hindu culture in Trinidad and Tobago. Hummingbirds were the focus at Yerette and the fascinating hummingbird talk we listened to by Theo Ferguson, followed by an incredible lunch prepared by his wife, Gloria. No rest for the weary, we head to Caroni National Park and one of the top experiences of dinner with thousands of Scarlet Ibis, the national bird of the islands. After a drive to the northeastern corner of the island, we are treated to endemic Trinidad Piping Guans and the nesting Leatherback Turtles in Grand Riviere.

Tobago

Driving back to the Piarco International Airport we board a prop airplane and fly to Tobago, our second island of the trip. Here we meet guide, Jason Radix, and immediately begin birding at Bon Accord sewage ponds, where the birding was excellent, and we had a chance to acclimate to a new guide and Island. We finished the day at Cuffie River Nature Retreat and numerous Rufous-vented Chachalacas. The following morning, we birded with Desmond Wright around the Cuffie River lodge, followed by lunch and a trip with Jason to the adventure farm and nature preserve in Plymouth. Our last stop was along the coast at the port of Plymouth and Fort James,

where we saw the Sandwich Tern (Cayenne) and learned some of the colonial history of the island. The last full day of our experience took us to the Gilpin Trace and the Main Ridge Forest Preserve. Here we had our first great observations of the important White-tailed Sabrewing (hummingbird) and other forest specialties. Driving the coastal road, we traveled to Little Tobago Island, where we met Zee and his boat crew for a hike and adventure on the top of Little Tobago Island for unique nesting seabirds like Red-billed Tropic bird and the Red-footed Booby.

Birds 206 species were recorded of which, 2 were endemic and 2 introduced species.
