# Cape May: Fall Migration Species List | October 1-7, 2024 with Naturalist Journeys



# Compiled by guide Greg Butcher. Our Kentucky-based birders included Steve and Janet, Jeff and Carol, and Muz.

We visited Cape May at the height of the fall raptor migration for Ospreys, Merlins, and Sharp-shinned and Cooper's Hawks. Although songbird migration was slow due to the lack of Northwest winds, the variety of birds was good, and the birding weather was excellent. Brigantine/Forsythe National Wildlife Refuge was very productive.

BIRDS: 130 species were recorded, including 10 species of ducks, 17 species of shorebirds, 5 species of gulls, 4 species of terns, 10 species of herons/egrets, 10 species of raptors, 10 species of sparrows (including towhee), and 11 species of warblers. Details are included below.
