Oaxaca Valley: Birds, Culture & Crafts July 22-30, 2024 | Species List With Naturalist Journeys

Summary: This fun, 9-day tour was filled with good, clear weather, gorgeous vistas, delicious meals worthy of indulgence, beautiful birds, and plenty of cultural exploration. We birded scrubby oak woodlands, brushy cactus scrub, and grasslands of the dry Oaxaca Valley. We also rose high in elevation to enjoy the cool, humid pine oak forests of the Sierra Norte. Going south of the Sierra Madres, we dipped out toes into tropical montane forests, too. Summertime is a challenging time for birding, as birds are quieter and more reclusive since they're busy raising young. Yet the variety of habitats we visited yielded plenty of avian rewards (139 total species), and we saw many of the target endemics we were after.

BIRDS (139)

We detected a total of 139 species. A couple of additions to the tour checklist (species which were not present in our hard-copy checklist) were the Strong-billed Woodcreeper (*Xiphocolaptes promeropirhynchus*) and Red-lored Parrot (*Amazona autumnalis*, an introduced species).
