# South Texas Birding & Nature Species List | November 11 – 19, 2024 with Naturalist Journeys

The Lower Rio Grande Valley of Texas is renowned among birders and nature enthusiasts across North America for its extraordinary biodiversity. This richness stems from its diverse habitats, its southernmost location in the U.S., and its position along the Central Flyway. As we traveled through the region, we witnessed this firsthand—large flocks of ducks, an incredible variety of shorebirds, and nineteen species of warblers. The resident species were equally remarkable, with sightings of gray hawks, red-crowned parrots, common pauraque, and vibrant green jays. Beyond the birds, we experienced unforgettable natural history moments. We watched a Texas indigo snake devour a blue spiny lizard and marveled at nearly fifty species of butterflies, expertly identified by world-renowned lepidopterist Robert Gallardo. The highlights were too numerous to list here —from a boat ride into Aransas National Wildlife Refuge gifting us with great views whooping cranes to exploring the dense subtropical thorn forest of Santa Ana National Wildlife Refuge and the serene beauty of Sabal Palm Sanctuary. Even when birds weren't in sight, the region's natural wonders ensured there was always something exceptional to see.

Following is a list of the birds, mammals, reptiles and amphibians we were fortunate to observe during the trip.

### MAMMALS (11 species):

**Mexican Long-nosed Armadillo** *Dasypus mexicanus* – Seen well at Laguna Atascosa NWR and at Resaca de la Palma SP

Eastern Cottontail Sylvilagus floridanus – multiple encounters throughout the last half of the tour Black-tailed Jackrabbit Lepus californicus – A few seen around the Corpus Christi International Airport Eastern Fox Squirrel Sciurus niger – Several seen around, mostly areas where oak trees were present Hispid Cotton Rat Sigmodon hispidus – Seen coming to the feeders at the National Butterfly Center Nutria Myocaster coypus – One hanging out in a pond at Santa Ana
 Collared Peccary Tayassu tajacu – A couple seen at Santa Ana NWR hanging out in a couple of the ponds there, and at Bentsen RGV SP
 White-tailed Deer Odocoileus virginianus – Seen around the Rockport area and at Laguna Atascosa NWR

**Bottlenose Dolphin** *Tursiops truncatus* – Seen from the boat ride out of Rockport and the ferry across to Port Aransas

**Coyote** *Canis latrans* – Seen feeding on a red drum head along the JFK Causeway near Snoopy's and one at Laguna Atascosa

Nilgai Boselaphus tragocamelus - Seen at Laguna Atascosa NWR on the auto loop area

# **REPTILES AND AMPHIBIANS (12 species):**

American Alligator Alligator mississippiensis – Large adult seen in the cattails at the Port Aransas Birding Center

**Rio Grande Cooter** *Pseudemys gorzugi* – Resting on rocks in the middle of the Rio Grande at Salineno **Red-eared Slider** *Trachemys scripta* – Seen in several water bodies including the Rio Grande and a few ponds

Texas Spiny Softshell Apalone spinifera emoryi – Seen in the pond at Lola's and in the Rio Grande
Brown Anole Anolis sagrei – Seen at the Inn at Fulton Harbor and at Tule Marsh
Green Anole Anolis carolinensis – One at Big Tree and one at Sabal Palm
Texas Spotted Whiptail Aspidoscelis gularis – Seen at Santa Ana and Falcon State Park
Blue Spiny Lizard Sceloporus cyanogenys – Seen best at Bentsen Rio Grande Valley State Park
Texas Spiny Lizard Sceloporus olivaceus – Seen at Big Tree on the Lamar Peninsula
Rose-bellied Lizard Sceloporus variabilis – Seen at Santa Ana NWR
Mesquite Lizard Sceloporus grammicus – Seen on a tree trunk at Santa Ana NWR
Texas Indigo Snake Drymarchon melanurus erebennus – Remarkably seen on several occasions, including at Sabal Palm Sanctuary and one devouring a Blue Spiny Lizard at Bentsen RGV SP
