Costa Rica: Birds & Nature Species List | March 5 – 12, 2025 with Naturalist Journeys

Costa Rica- The most bird-rich country in the new world, with nearly half (900 out 2,000) of all bird species in North America, utilizing its critical geography and habitat diversity at some point of their lives. This trip sampled as many of these habitats as possible with multi-day explorations in Caribbean lowland rainforests, midelevation mountain valleys, high elevation (over 7000 ft.) cloud forests. On the extension we added dry coastal forest and mangrove habitats and species to the trip.

Our locations included Hotel Bougainvillea (first night) in San Jose, a wonderful birding destination itself famous for its garden residents: Lesson's Motmots and Mottled Owls, Social Flycatchers and Brown Jays.

Our high-mountain/cloud forest birding was done from the Suria Lodge/Hotel (2 nights) where we searched for Costa Rica's most famous bird, the Resplendent Quetzal. We encountered ours on back mountain roads near Parque Nacional Los Quetzales and Pariso de Quetzals. After stunning looks at 2 males in this remote forested location, we also had one appear on our 6:00am bird walk around Suria Lodge.

Rancho Naturalista (2 nights) was our mid-level forest location. Known as a reliable location for elusive Snowcapped Hummingbird and a special visit from a Tyrah (large wolverine type weasel). We spent 2 days here exploring the grounds and enjoying the amazing veranda overlooking the feeding station.

Selva Verde (2 nights) In the lowland Caribbean rain forest provided us with 2 days of birding at the La Selva Biological station and an amazing boat tour on the Sarapiqui River. This is the habitat of Mantled Howler Monkeys, Sloths- we saw both Brown-throated three-towed and Hoffmanns Two-towed species here along with many more parrot species-including Scarlet Macaws.

Those that participated on the extension stayed one evening at Cerro Lodge, three nights at La Ensenada Lodge in Puntarenas Province along the shores of the Pacific's Colorado Gulf.

BIRDS: 226 individual species were recorded between our locations3 very diverse locations.
